As clinicians, however, we are often required to make thumbnail diagnoses, based on categories created by the study of large numbers of subjects. # **Instructor Bios:**

CLAUDIA BADER, MPS, LCAT, NCPsyA, LP, is a graduate of IEA, also having served as Executive Director and Director of Education for IEA, where she is currently a control analyst, supervisor, and faculty member. In private practice in NYC, she is published in the Encyclopedia of Psychology and Religion and many journals. Retired from university teaching since spring 2022, Claudia has taught Art Diagnosis to over a thousand students since 1995, at Pratt Institute of Design, the School of Visual Arts, the New School for Social Research, and Mjungi University in Seoul. She has pioneered the interface of spirituality, psychoanalysis, astrology, alchemy, art, and mandalas since 1973. Her research interests are rooted in exploring the way the inner and outer worlds inform each other; in particular, color and space in the psyche and the correlations between astrological archetypes, psychodynamics, and art. She will receive her PhD in psychoanalysis Fall 2022. Her dissertation topic is "Astrology and Transitional Phenomena."

CATHERINE BALLETTO, PhD, earned her BFA from the School of Visual Arts in New York City. Starting off as an art therapist, she established a practice foundation, which is informed jointly by humanist and psychodynamic schools of thought. Interested in systems and drawn to social work's implicit social and political consciousness, she pursued her MSW at Hunter College. Catherine completed her psychodynamic training at the Women's Therapy Centre Institute in NYC (now the WTCI), earning a certificate in Feminist Relational Psychodynamic Psychotherapy from their 3-year program. This training grounded her expertise in eating problems and body image issues in a formulation of the macro level, structural context of human development. Catherine completed additional training at the Institute for Human Identity, the first and oldest private institute founded to serve LGBTQ+ populations. She received her PhD from Smith College School for Social Work. Catherine has taught at Hampshire College and presently at Smith College SSW, where she additionally serves as the Course Coordinator for Comparative Psychodynamic Theory for Social Work Practice. She has extensive experience providing practicum-based education and supervision to interns from bachelors to doctoral levels, and of diverse professional disciplines. Catherine is dually licensed in NY and MA. Her practice, physically located in Northampton MA, offers in person and telehealth options and includes supervision and consultation to psychotherapists and trainees.

MERAV BEN-HORIN, LCSW, RYT, is a psychotherapist, psychoanalyst and yoga and meditation teacher, specializing in the mind-body connection. She completed her BA in Psychology at Hunter College, her MSW at NYU, and her psychoanalytic training at NIP, where she received the Educators Award for outstanding scholarly contribution. She practices in Brooklyn, integrating therapeutic yoga and mindfulness within an analytic framework, teaches yoga for emotional well-being and trauma relief, and leads retreats worldwide. In addition she provides consultation and supervision for therapists on how to incorporate mindfulness and somatic work into their practices.

DANA BROWNSTEIN, LP, NCPsyA, MA, has a Masters in Psychology from CUNY Hunter, Bachelor's in Psychology from New York University, and is a graduate of the Washington Square Institute for Psychoanalysis. She is also an EMDRIA-certified EMDR practitioner. Formerly, director, faculty, training & control analyst of the New York Center for Psychoanalytic Training where he graduated in 1990, faculty, the Hebrew Union College (NYC) where he taught communication and interpersonal skills, founder, director, & faculty member of LIU's adult education Center for Human Development. Gene's latest paper, *Phantoms in the Mind, Conflict, and the Analytic Relationship: mutative factors in psychoanalysis* for the International Forum of Psychoanalysis in Lisbon, Portugal. Presentations in NYC for Washington Square Institute include *Psychodynamics in Clinical Practice, Micro-Emotional Abuse: working through psychic wounds, Spectrum Psychodynamics: a synthesis of relational and modern drive psychoanalytic approaches.* Gene has taught such courses as Dream Interpretation, Countertransference, Dimensions of the Mind, Object Relations, Post-Freudian Theories, Character Disorders, Psychopathology, & Psychosomatics.
